


International Young Physicists' Tournament 2017

The Tournament

The IYPT, sometimes also referred to as 'Physics World Cup', is a teamoriented international scientific competition among teams of secondary school students. The Tournament has grown since its establishment in 1988 into one of the World's largest and most prestigious international physics contests with nations from all regions of the World competing annually. In July 2017 the event will be held in Singapore.

Construct a vacuum bazooka, study how wine glasses resonate, develop physics of spiral waves, investigate a magnetic landscape or pick another one from the interesting problems of the 2017 Tournament and investigate it! It will be fun



Build a single lens telescope, study the shape of a ferrofluid, figure out why methronomes syncronise under specific conditions or visualise tiny density fluctuations of air using Schlieren photography

The national teams consist of five students. During the Tournament the teams compete in 'Physics Fights', where they need to prove their ability to solve complicated scientific problems, to present solutions to these problems in a convincing way and to defend them in scientific discussions. Our team members will be selected during the Hungarian Young Physicists' Tournament Participation at both Tournaments is free of charge.

We are looking for **individual applicants of age 16 and above** who:

- Like physics and solving complex problems
- Speak decent English
- Have good presentation and teamwork skills
- Like travelling
- Are willing to spend time on real scientific work
